

Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS)

The CLASS is an observation

instrument developed to access classroom quality in infant, toddler and preschool—third grade classrooms. The CLASS dimensions are based on developmental theory and research suggesting that interactions between the children and teacher are the primary mechanism for development and learning.

The CLASS dimensions are based on interactions of children and teachers in the classroom, and does not evaluate the presence of materials but what the teachers do with the materials they have.

KidsReadyNC

Randolph County has been selected for the KidsReadyNC initiative of the Institute for Emerging Issues along with Catawba, Chowan and Rockingham counties. KidsReadyNC is an 18month initiative to help selected rural communities strengthen the capacity of their early childhood development systems. The focus of work, prioritized by the Partnership is: High Quality Birth-to-Eight Care and Education, specifically the Birth-Three year old content. This will be in direct alignment with the NC Pathways to Grade-Level Reading. Some of the issues to be addressed for this initiative:

- Infants, toddler, and twos teacher education
- Infants, toddler and twos teacher compensation
- Infants, toddlers and twos population in our child care programs
- Infants, toddlers and two year olds population in Randolph County
- High quality infant, toddler and twos classrooms

We now know that high-quality experiences in the first years of life set the stage for healthy development, school readiness, academic success, and more productive lives. Crucially, some 80% of the brain's structure is created during the first three years of life. Even as new connections are being formed, existing ones are made more complex in preparation for the development of higher order skills.

Research shows that all domains of development-social, emotional, intellectual, language, and physical—are interdependent and work together to promote a child's overall health and well being.

Our goal is to advance our early childhood community and create a powerful workforce so that all children have access to high-quality early childhood programs staffed by educated and skilled teachers who are equitably compensated. All these components will ultimately assist in the county's recognition as a premiere early childhood community with outstanding programs for young children.

Our KidsReadyNC committee is an arm of the Randolph Partnership for Children's I.N.S.P.I.R.E.D. (Invest, Nurture, Support, Prepare, Involve, Respond, Encourage, Depend) Randolph Collaborative.

The Reggio Emilia Approach to education

Recently, I had the incredible opportunity to join the Reggio Emilia study tour in Italy, with other early educators from North Carolina and Atlanta. This truly was a dream come true! Many of us have studied and are influenced from this approach, and how to incorporate a majority of its principles within our early childhood centers in Randolph County. This experience allowed for a deeper insight to the beliefs, values and cultural context of the Infant-Toddler and Preschool centers in Reggio Emilia.

Stated by the Salvador Allende Infant-Toddler Centre, "Families, teachers and children alike play a role that is of primary and equal importance and their participation in the life of the center is essential. The Reggio Emilia approach is the idea that the educational process thrives on encounters, exchanges, collaborations, borrowings.....and that only such a fertile environment can generate that sense of belonging to a small educational community, but also to a broad (yet divided) network of experiences aimed at promoting a child-centered culture".

With much pleasure, excitement and inspiration, I look forward to sharing additional knowledge of the Reggio Emilia Approach to education with our early childhood community.
