

Did you know?

Toxic stress weakens the architecture of the brain, which can lead to lifelong problems in learning, behavior, and physical and mental health.

Experiencing stress is an important part of healthy development. Activation of stress response produces a wide range of reactions that prepare the body to deal with threat. However, when these responses remain activated at high levels for significant periods of time, without supportive relationships to help calm them, toxic stress results.

This can impair the development of neural connections, especially in the areas of the brain dedicated to high-order skills.

The importance of early childhood experiences for brain development

The early years of a child's life are very important for later health and development. One of the main reasons is how fast the brain grows starting before birth and continuing into early childhood. Children are born ready to learn! They depend on parents, family members, caregivers and their first teachers to develop the right skills to become independent and lead healthy and successful lives. How the brain grows is strongly affected by the child's experiences with other people and their environment. Nurturing care of the mind is critical for brain development. Children grow and learn best in a safe environment where they are protected from neglect and from extreme or chronic stress with plenty of opportunities to play and explore.

The interactions of genes and experience shape the developing brain. Although genes provide the blueprint for the formation of brain circuits, these circuits are reinforced by repeated use. A major ingredient in this developmental process is the serve and return interaction between children and their parents, teachers and others in the community. In the absence of responsive caregiving - or if responses are unreliable or inappropriate - the brain's architecture does not form as expected, which can lead to disparities in learning and behavior. Ultimately, genes and experiences work together to construct brain architecture.

Cognitive, emotional, and social capacities are inextricably intertwined throughout the life course. The brain is a highly integrated organ and it's multiple functions operate in coordination with each other. Emotional well-being and social competence provide a strong foundation for emerging cognitive abilities, and together they are the bricks and mortar of brain architecture. The emotional and physical health, social skills, and cognitive linguistic capacities that emerge in the early years are all important for success in school, the workplace, and in the larger community.



As we forge ahead with developing a better understanding of brain development, let's also include that brains are built over time. The basic architecture of the brain is constructed through an ongoing process that begins before birth and continues through adulthood. Early experiences affect the quality of the architecture establishing either a sturdy or a fragile foundation for all of the learning, health and behavior that follow.

We, as early educators, have the rewarding task and responsibility of helping to build those sturdy foundations. We know that a nurturing environment in the early years has major effects on learning in school and physical and mental health throughout a lifetime.

Back to Basics! The development of the brain is influenced by many factors, including a child's relationships, experiences and environment. The role early educators play in building a baby's or a young child's brain is crucial in building a foundation for future learning, health and life success! As we prepare for a new school year, we will focus on the basic ingredients of a high quality environment for our children. In building relationships, the interactions between teachers and child, and the opportunities for engaging experiences within the classroom and outdoor environment, are key! Along with a multitude of additional trainings: Curriculum Planning/Foundations, Health and Wellness, Reggio Emilia Approach to Education, Social and Emotional development, Resilience/Trauma informed, and many others, we encourage all of you to join us in attending a robust selection of trainings that will enhance and embellish your teaching practice!
