These warm summer days tend to focus us on numbers and statistics, don't they? We're always thinking about things like temperatures, humidity levels, number of days since our last rainfall, or the times for low and high tides.

For the moment, I am asking you to zero in on a stat that stays at the forefront of my mind as I carry out my work for the Partnership for Children:



of brain growth happens in the first 3 years of life.



The developmental plasticity of a young child's brain is the reason why we so often say children are like sponges, soaking up everything around them. The soaking up part is only half of the story, because young children don't simply take in information and passively sit on it – but rather they actively use information to make sense of the world around them and to take on their next, higher-ordered learning feats.

Each interaction with a parent, grandparent, early educator, or other caregiver is a *brain-building* interaction for a young child. Inside the brain, dense neural networks are forming that can make learning fun and easy — when time and focused attention are given to a baby, infant, or toddler. In playing a simple game of Peek-A-Boo, a grandmother, for example, is helping her grandchild lay deeper grooves in his neural networks, encouraging him to be curious, and motivating him to seek out new information. Perhaps best of all, she's helping him discover the joy of feeling competent and confident that comes when she removes her shielding hands, allowing him to find his grandmother's face.

A child's early learning partners – parents, grandparents, teachers, aunts, uncles, and other caregivers – have tremendous impact on the little one's future success. So, if your summer plans don't already include something as lofty as *building brains*, please find a way to work it in! I'm betting it will be the most fun you have all summer.
