Inspirations

With families being the glorious, complex, life-giving, and sometimes maddening things that they are, it's no wonder they've provided such rich fodder for T.V. sitcoms for the past 60+ years! Wouldn't it be wonderful if all the things that go awry in our real families could be resolved as swiftly and as tidily as they are in a half-hour on the small screen?

I am of the firm belief that there are unprecedented pressures on today's families. While being a parent is never easy — even under 'ideal' circumstances — many of our families today are faced with challenges that are truly overwhelming. Thus, when I think about the



overarching goals of the Randolph Partnership for Children, I always return to the child-family dynamic as a particularly critical piece of the puzzle.

A parent is a child's first teacher. This simple sentence is profound in its range of truth and depth of impact. Parenting style and the home learning environment are two of the most significant predictors of cognitive performance among young children. For children who are not in any formal early education program — which is nearly one-third of our county's children under 5 — the important role of parent as teacher is amplified even more.

Engaging parents in ways that honor their expertise and build on their understanding of their children's development is critical to school readiness success! In addition to the Family Coalition you are going to learn about in this newsletter, our Partnership offers home visiting services to families, parent education classes, family learning and play groups, and a robust variety of literacy programs. We take great pride in investing our public and private dollars where there is proven impact and I'll share a quick example: Last year, through our Incredible Years family support program funded by a Children's Trust Fund grant from NC DHHS, 100% of participants reported an increase in the use of positive parenting behaviors and became aware of alternative methods of discipline.

Helping parents feel empowered and supported is necessary if we want our children to enter school healthy and ready to succeed. I invite you to contact me if you'd like to know more about our goals or any of our Family Support initiatives.

Family Coalition off to a great start!

As an extension of the ShapeNC initiative in Randolph County, Family & Literacy Engagement Specialist Meredith Shields launched our new Family Coalition this year.

This new group met twice each week for six weeks over the summer to provide families the tools needed to realize healthy lifestyle goals.

The Family Coalition is open to all families with children enrolled in any of the 32 centers in the county that participate in the ShapeNC program.

In addition, all directors and center staff at ShapeNC-affiliated centers and their families are welcome to participate.

Participants drive the content of the program, as professionals work with them to address goals for healthy eating and active living. The group also addresses contemporary parenting challenges. While the parents are meeting, the children participate in their own ShapeNC-inspired activities. Dinner is also provided.

Officials from Truliant Federal Credit
Union visited the Partnership on July 23 to
present a \$1000 Community Mini Grant
check.

We wrote our grant for diapers. We did this because we learned that as many as 1 in 3 families face the daily crisis of diaper need — having an insufficient supply of diapers resulting in an impossible choice between buying food/paying bills or purchasing diapers. For many of us, it's

incomprehensible, but for many Randolph County families living in poverty conditions, diaper need is a very real health issue.

According to a 2013 report in the journal Pediatrics, the inability to provide a diaper increases the stress levels of mothers, affects mother-child bonding, and can negatively impact the babies' brain development.

"It resonates when you hear people are having to make a choice between food, bills and diapers," Truliant Community Engagement Supervisor Renee Shipko said. Thanks to this grant, when a parent participant in one of our programs is identified as having a dire need for diapers, we will be able to provide help.

When Jim Gailey of the Modern Woodmen of America heard about this need, he rallied chapters in Seagrove (14195) and High Point (17109) to help with our diaper bank, as well! The two chapters provided more than \$500 worth of diapers after hearing about our Truliant Federal Credit Union Community Mini Grant application.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library expansion in Randolph County
