Loose parts are a collection of natural or synthetic materials, found or purchased – anything children can move, manipulate, control and change within their play.

The open-ended qualities of loose parts allow children to recreate and represent their cultural and home languages in a variety of ways, represent everyday moments they experience within their families including holiday traditions, and open opportunities for the classroom community to create and celebrate diversity. When we first partnered with NC Partnership for Children to expand enrollment funding to include all children younger than 5, about 4% were enrolled. Today, 20% are enrolled.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if 100% of children younger than 5 in Randolph County were receiving their very own free book in the mail, addressed personally to them, every month until their 5th birthdays?

### Hummus Dip & Turkey Peppers



Thanksgiving begins a season of rich, delicious foods served at holiday meals celebrating the diverse cultures and traditions that make up the melting pot that is America.

Here's a healthy recipe from Super Health Kids that is as fun as it is delicious.

### Ingredients

- 15 ounce chickpeas (garbanzo beans), canned
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 medium lemon
- 1/2 cup yogurt, plain
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

### Serve with:

1 each medium yellow, red, green and orange bell peppers.

### Directions

- 1. Drain and rinse chickpeas, mince garlic, and juice lemon.
- 2. Blend above ingredients along with yogurt, oil, and salt in a food processor until smooth.
- 3. Cut the top off of one pepper and remove the seeds; cut the other peppers into strips.
- 4. Fill the hollowed-out pepper with hummus then add the strips, positioning them as feathers; use scraps to make a face, using a bit of hummus to make everything stick. Find the eyes in the cake-decorating section of your craft store.
