### **Teacher for a Day**

What's it like to spend your days with a classroom of toddlers? A couple of business leaders in Randolph County found out during American Education Week in November.

"It was challenging," Mandy Gaines said of her experience in Alicia Cruz Ortega's preschool class at Precious Memories Preschool.

Mandy, a manager for Samson & the Lion Natural Food, and Aaron Lucas, from Asheboro Key & Lock, each spent three hours experiencing what it's like to be an early educator in Randolph County.

Aaron was in Sabrina Lucas' toddler class at The Kids of Hope, where he learned the importance of being visually aware of where all the toddlers are throughout the day, and how tiring it is to provide that supervision.

"My favorite part of hosting was allowing them to experience what we do every day," Sabrina said. "They saw what we actually do as educators. That we not only love and care for these children but we also teach them too. [Teacher for a Day] helped everyone to better appreciate what us as educators do for the community, these families and the children."

Both were worn out, but in a good way, when it was time to leave. And that's when they received one more eye-opening nugget. Each was presented with a faux check for what they would have earned had they been employed by the center. Their checks were for \$30.

Early educators in Randolph County make an average of just over \$10 per hour. Yet they are charged with providing environments and interactions that build brain architecture—80% of brain growth occurs in those first three years of life—and prepare our babies for successful, healthy lives.

The Teacher for a Day project was created and facilitated by Scarlet Welborn, Infant-Toddler Specialist with Randolph Partnership for Children. Scarlet plans to replicate the project with more business leaders and child care centers to demonstrate the importance of early education as well as the need for higher pay in the field.

"This project was created to shed light on the Early Childhood Professionals who are working hard to create high quality care for our future workforce, but with little compensation," Scarlet Welborn, infant-toddler technical assistance specialist, explained. "I want to give our teachers a voice, and educate others on all the responsibilities of caring for children that are not only our future, but the children of our present community workers."
