# **Inspirations**

The festive albeit chaotic holiday season can be a perfect time to help young children, even toddlers and preschoolers, learn about their culture. And they're not too young for us to expand these teachable moments to embrace other cultures and the uniqueness that makes us all special.

Children, even at very young ages, carry their culture with them wherever they go—to the child care center, preschool, or kindergarten, for example. Like us, they don't leave their culture or language at home. They take with them all of the unique cultural skills, tools, and knowledge the family has taught them during the early years of life.



That's why it's so important to take a moment here and there during the holidays to talk to your child about why you are celebrating the way you are, or decorating the way you are, or eating the foods you are eating. Share how and when your family began these traditions. Talk about how old you were when you first ate the foods that are now part of every holiday dinner.

Speaking of eating, young children learn best through their senses. Being able to speak, touch, taste, see, and feel their culture makes it that much more real. In addition to talking about the history of a decades-old yam recipe, invite the children to hold an uncooked yam, stir the mixture, see it before and after baking, and taste the finished product.

Then go that extra mile. Help your child "see" and "hear" different cultures and languages in the home by labeling objects in your home in different languages —your native language and one your family may be interested in learning together. What is the word for Christmas tree in Spanish? Or the French word for stocking? Or the Urdu word for snow? Try a recipe or make a craft from another holiday tradition or culture.

Perhaps the easiest way to embrace different cultures and traditions is to take time during the holidays to pause and read a book or two that can help our little ones to start thinking about being part of their own cultures, part of the world, part of humanity! A few good examples of books that are readily available include *We're Different, We're The Same*, a Sesame Street book, *Whoever You Are* by Mem Fox, and *All the Colors of the Earth* by Sheila Hamanaka.

#### **Book Drop!**



#### **Racism & Child Development**

We know that when stress response systems are activated for prolonged periods of time (<u>Toxic Stress</u>), a child's longterm health and wellness is compromised.

Researchers at Harvard University's Center on the Developing Child show in a newly released infographic how dealing with institutional racism and structural bias can act as toxic stress, setting up our children for a lifetime of chronic health issues.



As we move forward into 2021, the Partnership will be working to support the efforts of child care providers and our community to eliminate racism and bias. Let's work together to embrace the uniqueness of every child, ensuring they all receive every opportunity to meet their full potential!
