Inspirations

I am participating in a Leadership Transformation Table series. Last week's lesson was on listening and focusing one's attention on understanding the other person. Our lesson began with a quote from Ralph Nichols.

"The most basic of all human needs is the need to understand and be understood. The best way to understand people is to listen to them."

From there, we went deeper into how to set aside internal and external distractions and be fully engaged and fully present while another person is talking.



When I visit our early childhood classrooms throughout the county, I've noticed how our early educators often will bend down during a conversation to be at

eye level with the little one. I love seeing this! Those educators understand how important it is to that child at that moment to be heard and understood. Bringing oneself to eye level is a powerful communication to the child as it denotes focus and full engagement. And full engagement is hard to do when there's a classroom full of other students! While that level of focus may be brief —just an exchange of a couple of sentences or two—it is a powerful interaction that leads to respect, trust, and mutual understanding.

In our modern world of continuous information and distractions, it's incredibly tempting at times to tune out even those most important to us. While it's a safe bet that the future will bring even more ubiquitous technologies that compete for our attention, I'll bet that our young children who are having those eye-level conversations will authentically grasp the importance of listening to understand.

Quick facts about **International Mud Day**:

 Began in 2009 at the World Forum for Early Childhood Care and Education in Belfast, Northern Ireland



- Celebrated all over the world at the end of June. This year, it will be celebrated on Wednesday, June 29.
- Created to connect children to the Earth and soil, and promote exploring through movement and play in wonderfully messy mud!

Ways you can celebrate:

- Make mud! Let your little ones mix dirt and water to create their own mud.
- Paint with mud on an old sheet, on the sidewalk, or on a wall.
- Build with mud using molds or freestyle.
- "Bake" with mud in a mud kitchen.
- Bring the mud inside. Put dirt in a container like a plastic tub and add water.
- Don't be afraid to get dirty!
- Donate clothes to nurseries/child care centers for children who need clothes they can wear to get dirty.


