#### Randolph Partnership for Children Celebrates 20th Annual Night of the Stars

**Archdale, N.C. (May 12, 2023)** — The Randolph Partnership for Children proudly hosted its 20th annual Night of the Stars event on May 11 at the Lazy E Events Center in Archdale, NC. This milestone event continued the tradition of celebrating early childhood educators for their exceptional contributions to the healthy development of young children in Randolph County. The event also honored teachers who have recently completed degrees or certificates in early childhood education.

Beverly Mooney, the owner of Millstone Creek Orchard, graciously emceed the event, which featured a keynote address by Dr. Sheri Grace of Piedmont Forest School. Dr. Grace's speech emphasized play activities, such as pretend play and storytelling, and their part in early literacy development.

"My concern is that, when we insist that children stay still, stay quiet, and stay indoors and refrain from interacting with one another so that we can "teach" them letters and academic skills, we displace the experiences kids should be having," said Dr. Grace in her keynote.

Lisa Hayworth, Executive Director of the Randolph Partnership for Children, presented awards to the honorees, highlighting their dedication and commitment to providing high-quality early childhood education.

"It was heartening to see so many of our county's early educators come together to celebrate their colleagues' educational achievements," said Lisa Hayworth, Executive Director of the Randolph Partnership for Children. She continued, "In a profession as demanding as early childhood education, it is vital to have peer support, and one could certainly sense that support and those feelings of pride in this celebration."
