What Are The Basics?



If you've been a long-time subscriber to Sidewalk Chalk you probably already know a bit about The Basics. With our new subscribers and new format we thought it would be a good idea to go back to the beginning.

The Basics are five parenting and caregiving principles that encompass much of what experts find is important for children from birth to age 5. The five principles are short and easy to remember so caregivers can make the most of the time that they spend with their children.



Maximize Love, Manage Stress

Children thrive in environments that are safe, loving, and predictable. In a world where things are often new or chaotic, you can share your calm with them



Talk, Sing, and Point

Children learn language from birth. We as caregivers can support their learning by responding to their sounds, using a loving tone of voice, and pointing to the things we are talking about.



Count, Group, and Compare

Every child's brain is wired for math. Make talking about numbers, shapes, patterns, and comparisons a focus of your time together and watch your child learn to love math.



Explore Through Movement and Play

Children are like scientists who love making discoveries. Watch to see what interests your child, then encourage their curiosity and help them learn when they play and explore.



Read and Discuss Stories

Reading turns kids into confident thinkers. Make books a regular part of your relationship from the very beginning.

Community Resource Spotlight: Parents as Teachers



Parents as Teachers (PAT) is an early childhood parent education and family support program, which also promotes and encourages early literacy. Personal home visits are at the heart of the Parents as Teachers program. Parent educators provide age-appropriate information, address parenting and caregiver needs and concerns, and engage the whole family in fun, nurturing activities. There are also group meetings for participating families; free developmental, health, vision and hearing screenings for the children; and connections to area resources that support parents and caregivers on their demanding journey as their children's first and most important teachers.

To be eligible for the program your child must be between the ages of birth and 4 years old or you must be an expecting mother. The program is offered at no cost to eligible families. If you would like more information or to sign up please contact one of the parent educators below.


Into the Woods
