## **Child Care Crisis Breakfast**



The Randolph County Partnership for Children hosted a critical breakfast briefing last May 22nd, at the Pinewood Country Club. Over 70 attendees, including local community leaders, policymakers, and educators came together to learn about and collaborate on the child care crisis in Randolph County.

The meeting had important speakers such as Preston Roseboro, Regional Impact Manager for Future NC, Tracy Harrell, owner of the Randleman Enrichment Center, and a poignant recorded message from a local parent affected by a recent child care center closure. The parent's shared experience highlighted the realworld impacts of the crisis, a touching message for attendees.

"This gathering is just the beginning of our concerted efforts to tackle this crisis head-on," said Lisa Hayworth, Executive Director at the Randolph County Partnership for Children. "The discussions today have laid the groundwork for a plan that involves all stakeholders in the community."

The event emphasized collaborative strategies to mitigate the effects of the crisis, including exploring new opportunities to provide child care, enhancing support for current providers, and implementing policies to ensure sustainable operations of child care centers.

The Randolph County Partnership for Children is committed to continuing the conversation and working with all community members to find viable solutions.



The Primary Goal of Foster Care is to provide a safe, temporary place for children to live until they can be in a permanent placement, whether that may be with birth family, relatives or a pre-adoptive family. Children of any age from birth to eighteen years of age may come into care.



Foster care is a crucial support system for children who, for various reasons, cannot remain with their birth families. It provides a safe and nurturing environment where children can thrive while their birth families work towards reunification or other permanency options. In our community, foster care is more than just a system; it's a network of dedicated individuals and organizations committed to the well-being of every child.

### **Pedal Safe:**

**Bike Safety Tips for Young Children** 



As we gear up for National Bike Month, it's essential to ensure our youngest riders are equipped with the knowledge and skills to stay safe on two wheels. Biking is a fun and healthy activity for children, but it's crucial to prioritize safety at all times. Here are some essential bike safety tips for young children:

- 1. Helmet Heroes: Emphasize the importance of wearing a properly fitted helmet every time they ride. Helmets can reduce the risk of head injury by up to 85%.
- 2. Right Size, Right Ride: Ensure your child's bike or tricycle is the correct size for them. They should be able to touch the ground with their feet when seated and comfortably reach the handlebars.
- 3. Supervised Rides: Always supervise young children while they're biking or riding a tricycle. Keep them within sight and reach to provide guidance and assistance.
- 4. Learn the Rules: Teach children basic traffic rules and safety guidelines for biking, including stopping at stop signs, looking both ways before crossing, and signaling their intentions.
- 5. Practice Makes Perfect: Encourage regular practice in a safe, open area away from traffic until your child feels confident and comfortable on their bike or tricycle.

By instilling these safety habits early on, we can help our children develop a lifelong love of biking while keeping them safe on the road. Happy riding!
