The NC Pre-K Application for the 2024-25 School Year is Coming



NC Pre-K application for the 2024-25school year will open sometime in mid-January.

What is NC Pre-K?

The North Carolina Pre-Kindergarten Program (NC Pre-K) is a preschool program for children who may otherwise not have access to the preschool experience. The program provides preschoolers with curriculum-based, age-appropriate programming that enhances cognitive, social and emotional growth in preparation for elementary school, at no cost to the family. To qualify for the program a child must be 4 years old by August 31 and meet one of the following criteria:

- Family income is at or below 75% of the State Median Income (SMI)
- Child diagnosed with a special need
- Parent actively serving in the military and called to active duty within the past 18 months or who was seriously injured or killed while on active duty

Where Can I Apply? There are three ways to apply:

What Do I Need to Apply?

You must provide the following documentation listed below for your application to be processed.

- · Child's Birth Certificate
- Child's Updated Immunization
- Record Verification of Income (4 consecutive pay stubs from both parents in the home or provide 1040 tax forms-ONLY if self-employed for current year)
- Parent photo ID
- 2 bills (water, electric, or cell bill) with your name, address, and showing a current date for proof of residency or your rental/lease agreement
- Child's Medicaid Card (if applicable)
- Guardianship papers (if applicable)
- Child's IEP papers (if applicable)

Without copies of these documents, your application cannot be considered.
