Bringing The Basics to Life:

Daily Moments of Love and Learning



Hello, caregivers! In our journey of nurturing young minds, we've explored The Basics foundational principles for early childhood development. Let's bring these principles to life through simple activities at various times of the day:

Morning Basics: Kickstart the day with love and engagement. Maximize love with morning cuddles and smiles. Manage stress by sticking to a predictable morning routine. Talk and sing while getting dressed or during breakfast. Point out the window to explore the day ahead.

Lunchtime Basics: Nourish hearts and minds during lunch. Maximize love by sharing stories and asking about your child's morning. Manage stress with a relaxed mealtime. Talk about the colors and flavors of the food. Sing a lunchtime song. Point out ingredients on their plate. Read and discuss a short story for dessert.

Indoor Play Basics: Make playtime an adventure indoors. Maximize love with imaginative play and laughter. Manage stress by organizing play areas and offering choices. Talk and sing during play. Point at objects during a scavenger hunt. Count and group toys by color or size. Explore through movement with a dance party.

Bedtime Basics: End the day with love and stories. Maximize love with bedtime stories and cuddles. Manage stress with a calming routine. Talk about the day and dreams ahead. Sing a soothing lullaby. Point at the pictures in their favorite storybook. Read and discuss stories to inspire sweet dreams.

These small, intentional steps bring 'The Basics' to life, nurturing love, language, math, and emotional skills. Embrace these moments with your little ones and watch them grow.

RPC Honored by Asheboro Randolph Chamber of Commerce




